## a way of life

Sunday, January 11, 2015

The Holy Trinity is one of those mysteries of our faith which is almost impossible for us to perceive and comprehend. Yet it is presented to us in today's Gospel all at once: The Son, Jesus, is baptized; the Holy Spirit descends upon Him; and God proclaims, "You are my beloved son; with you I am well pleased."

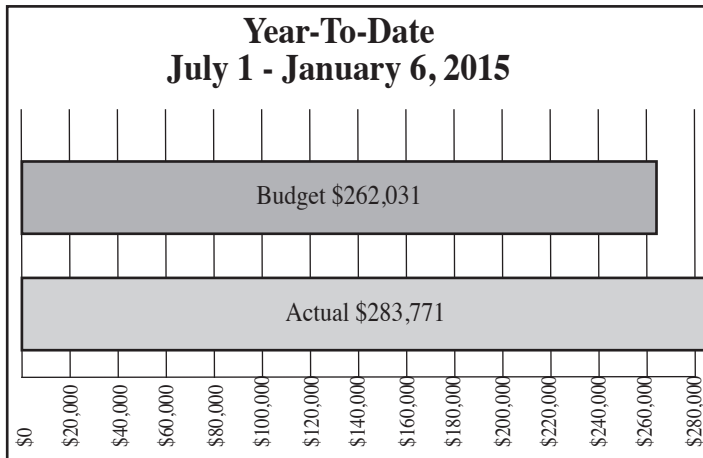
The Catechism of the Catholic Church (#253) states, "The Trinity is One. We do not confess three Gods, but one God in three persons, the 'consubstantial Trinity.' The divine persons do not share one divinity among themselves but each of them is God whole and entire." Each time we make the Sign of the Cross we reinforce our belief in the Trinity, and each time we make that sign we should think of the beauty of that concept. "Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit... now and forever."

As we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord and an appreciation of the Holy Trinity, we need to supplement that with our appreciation of two facets of our faith — prayer and liturgy. St. Therese of Lisieux called prayer "a surge of the heart." Stewardship, of course, involves a conversion of the heart. Each of must strive for that conversion, and it is most easily accomplished through prayer and liturgy.

**Cardinal Marx Talk:**

On Thursday, Jan 15 at 6:00pm, Cardinal Reinhard Marx, Archbishop of Munich and Freising, Germany, will deliver the Roger W. Heyns Lecture in Religion and Society. Free tickets are required, available to Stanford students, faculty and staff at <http://heynslecture.eventbrite.com>. (Tickets for the general public have sold out.) The event is in Cemex Auditorium, Knight Management Center. Those who have reserved tickets are asked to arrive at the Auditorium by 5:45.

Cardinal Reinhard Marx, Archbishop of Munich and Freising, has emerged as one of the Roman Catholic Church's most influential figures. He currently serves as the head of the German Bishops' Conference and as President of the Commission of the Bishops' Conferences in the European Union. He is a member of the Council of Cardinals, which advises Pope Francis on church governance, and was appointed head of the new Council for the Economy, designed to oversee the Vatican's economic management.

Cardinal Marx has written and spoken widely on economic issues and the contemporary relevance of Catholic Social Teaching. His book *Das Kapital: A Plea for Man* (2008) echoes the economic worldview that Pope Francis put forth in *Evangelii Gaudium*.

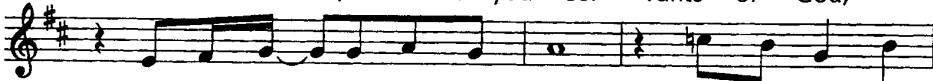
