## >>>> Palms:

Please bring in your palm leaves from last Palm Sunday to one of the Masses today, March 2. They will be collected at the door and used to make the ashes for Ash Wednesday. (March 5th) Or drop them off at the CCAS offices in Old Union.

## Ash Wednesday Schedule:

This Wednesday is Ash Wednesday. Masses are at 8:00am, 4:30 and 8:00pm. There is an ecumenical service at noon. All services are held in Memorial Church. Please see the fasting regulations printed in the bulletin.

## Pre-Holy Week Concert/Liturgical Arts Series:

## Lenten Fasting Regulations:

**Abstinence:** abstinence from eating meat is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays during Lent. All persons are bound by the law of the Church to abstain from the day after their 14th. birthday.

**Fasting:** The Church's law of fast binds on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. The law of fasting obliges from the day after one's 18th. birthday until the day after one's 59th birthday. Fasting means that one full meatless meal per day may be eaten. Two other meatless meals may be taken sufficient to maintain strength, but together they should not equal a full meal. Liquids, including milk and fruit juice, may be taken between meals. If health or ability to work are affected, fasting does not oblige.

Private, self-imposed observance of fasting on all week days of Lent is strongly recommended. Pastors and parents are to see to it that children who are not bound by the laws of fast and abstinence are educated in an authentic sense of penance, conversion and reconciliation.

### Small Acts with Great Love

*"Not all of us can do great things. But we can do small things with great love."*

--Mother Teresa

In Ash Wednesday's reading this coming week, we will hear the Lord's invitation to "Return to me with your whole heart." "We will", we say, "as soon as I finish this \_\_\_\_\_." We think we will focus on what God wants as soon as we can clear the deck and we can bring prepared hearts and minds and our full attention to the season of Lent. We procrastinate, we evade, we avoid. We feel we are not ready or don't have enough time. But perhaps that is the perfectionist in us, and the tendency to put other things first. Easy to do.

Let's start Lent with the acknowledgment that God doesn't require or expect perfection. Every person in this community is a valued member and any act of love that we do is valued. We are the body of Christ and no individual contribution is too small. If we all perform small acts with great love, together we can build a vibrant community as Christ's disciples. Here are some suggestions for ways that you can get started on your Lenten journey of doing small acts of great love:

- Exchange prayer intentions with the people you greet at the beginning of mass. We will strengthen the bonds within our community through these prayers for one another.
- Everyone in this community has been blessed with so many God given, unique gifts and talents that we encourage all of you to share as the body of Christ:
- Lips of Christ:
  - Sing during the communion reflection
  - Volunteer to read the scripture during the mass
- Offer words of encouragement to those who are stressed
- Hands of Christ:
  - Help to distribute communion
- Write a paragraph for the stewardship column
- Eyes of Christ:
  - View with compassion and understanding someone you've avoided or disdained
- Look around at others and see their wants and needs
- Ears of Christ
  - Attend an ESTEEM talk or Newman Night
  - Listen to a friend or family member with your full attention and love
- Be the heart of Christ
- Reach out and help those in need through a service project
- Be patient with those around you and with yourself
- Check out the Stewardship Leadership Team's prayer website. We will post a biblical passage and a saint to inspire you for the 40 days of Lent. We also encourage you to post your prayer intentions on this site so that we can pray for the members of the community during this Lenten season. Details will be posted this week.
- Investigate the different Catholic sites and prayer opportunities on the free CC@S Mobile App. It is chock-full of daily readings, prayers and reflections. This is a wonderful resource for deepening your relationship with God. Links to the app are on the front page of the bulletin.

Today's reading from Christ's Sermon on the Mount encourages us to trust in our faith. In a sense, we are encouraged to release our perfectionism and our desire to control. Don't let the perfect be the enemy of good. Start small. Try doing a small act with great love each of the 40 days of Lent and see how you and those you touch are transformed.
