You know how it is when you go to the movies in April and among the previews is one for “a coming attraction” in the fall? Still quite a ways off. And, though you may be intrigued by what you see and hear, you’re sure to forget the movie in the meantime? Well, this page may seem a little bit like that. As I understand it, recently Fr. Carl basically said his “good-byes” to you all. So, Fr. Nathan has asked me (as Fr. Carl’s eventual successor) to introduce myself to you, although I won’t be arriving until a few months from now. So here goes, a few highlights. (Kindly forgive the small print.)

Prior to being ordained in 1995, I worked for nine years as a criminal defense attorney and then for four years as a Superior Court judge. I am admitted to the practice of law in Arizona and California.

While in studies for the priesthood, I focused on two areas of specialization: medical ethics and spiritual direction and the giving of retreats.

In 1999, while living in Las Vegas (the city is far more Catholic than you may realize!), I served as Coordinator of Spiritual Care for one of the largest hospices in the U.S. Eventually, I founded a specialized ministry called Face to Face, a ministry offering support for critically-ill patients and their caregivers and also providing educational programs for physicians, nurses and other medical professionals. Said to be the only Catholic priest in the nation working full-time in palliative care and hospice, I had the privilege of “walking with” a few thousand seriously-ill and dying patients from all walks of life—regardless of their diagnosis, regardless of their faith background.

In 2005, I completed a term as Socius/Vicar Provincial (the #2 person in administration) for our Dominican province.

Most recently, I have been at our parish in Benicia, CA, which was founded in 1854.

- * attended University of Notre Dame Law School on full scholarship
- * mid-way through law school, drafted into the U.S. Army during peak of troop build-up in Viet Nam
- * later finished law school at ASU
- * always worked: through 8th grade, high school, college, and law school
- * a “99 bar rating” as a judge
- * was in the courtroom virtually daily for 13 years
- * front-page cases; some received international attention
- * rooted for the A’s since 1954 (that is not a typo)
- * main physical exercise for 25 years was running; as a result, recently I had to have total knee replacements in both knees.

While completing law school I met my first Dominican at the ASU Newman Center. What attracted me was the Dominican Ideal: the active/contemplative vision of religious life, which St. Dominic, the most modern man of his time, invented. I felt that anyone—whether they’re a doctor, judge, realtor, construction worker, scientist, secretary, whatever—

should have both active and contemplative sides to their life. I mean, what does a mother give her child if not her good example and the benefit of her wisdom and reflections on life? So, I felt that any religious person struggling with that challenge of being both active and contemplative would always have something relevant to share with others.

As for spiritual influences, I try to keep it simple: the four Gospels and the Book of Psalms. It’s all in there. It’s really all you need.

For spiritual nourishment, I repeatedly turn to: Thomas Merton, Macrina Wiederkehr (a cloistered nun in Arkansas, who not many will know), Sebastian Moore (even fewer will recognize his name, but he’s exceptionally important), the poet Rainer Maria Rilke, Leo Rock (a Jesuit, now deceased), and a few spiritual directors (whom I’m sure would prefer to remain anonymous, for obvious reasons).

I really liked my ministry with the Dying. I believe Dying has a lot to teach us; it would be a shame to wait until we are actually dying to learn what that is.

We Americans live in a death-denying culture, but I believe that the last season of a person’s life can be transforming. So, admittedly, my “ego statement” is: “If a doctor tells you that you have six months or less to live, and, if you want to make this last season or chapter of your life ‘quality time,’ well then, I want to be the one you call.”

When I first meet with a terminally-ill person who has called me, I often say: “I think you can be as close to God during this time as you want to be; now, how close do you want to get?” I have been trained as a “spiritual director” and I used that model in this ministry. It’s just that all my “clients” were terminally-ill.

Barring a tragic car accident or abrupt cardiac event or the like, 90% of us will have time to reflect before dying. It can be an exciting time of life. Everyone’s experiences with death are different, I know, so that last statement can sound “flip” to some. I’m talking about the 90% who have “time, sweet time,” as Tim McGraw sang in Live Like You Were Dying. I really do have many, many ideas of how this time can be transformational and filled with love. I always feel privileged to be with someone who knows that their time is now limited.

I also started seven support groups for doctors, nurses, social workers. Groups of 8-12 each met every two weeks to look at their own spirituality—to nurture that spiritual core that would enable them to be with the Dying day in, day out. The groups continued to meet for over 3 years. Also, I have given countless talks & training seminars on these topics.

Most all hospices tend to think that they are very spiritual. My experiences told me otherwise. So, in essence, I became a consultant to hospices (in several states) to suggest ways they could better meet their patients’ needs.

I have preached and/or given talks on spirituality at Clemson, Memphis State, University of Washington, UW Medical School, Utah, Arizona State, Cal Berkeley (sorry), UNLV, and University of Oregon.

I truly look forward to meeting all of you and learning of your own faith journeys. God Bless!
