Have you ever been hungry? Really hungry? People who have experienced intense hunger may appreciate Jesus' words that He is the "Bread of Life" to a greater extent than others. We are aware that the world is filled with people who hunger and thirst, but most of us have never experienced the true pain of that experience.

While most of us are fortunate enough to avoid the pains of physical hunger, in our modern world and society, spiritual hunger runs rampant.

When the Lord says in today's Gospel "This is the bread that came down from Heaven... whoever eats this bread will live forever," He is addressing a need we have that is much deeper than physical hunger. He is also telling us that the reward for eating this bread — for taking it into our inner being, for changing our mind and heart because of it — is eternal life. Blessed Mother Teresa said, "The hunger for love is much more difficult to remove than the hunger for bread." This is the hunger we need to deal with in our faith lives, for when we love, we are beginning to satisfy that spiritual hunger to which the Lord refers.

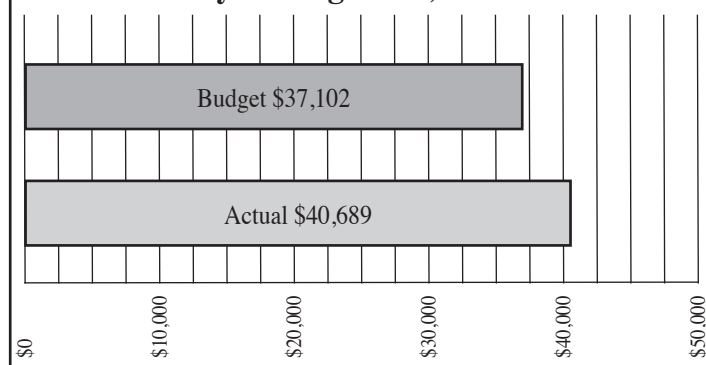
Second Collection:

Children's Religious Education:

We offer a wonderful program for children ages 3-grade 5 called the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, a Montessori-based curriculum based on scripture, prayer, and liturgy. There are 3 levels for the children. Catechists are experienced and have received national certification. There are many "hands-on" materials, providing a grace-filled environment for the children to learn and explore their relationship with God. Sessions meet Sunday mornings, 8:45-10:15am beginning Oct. 4. Sacrament preparation is included.

We also have a seminar-style junior high group that meets 9-10:15 on Sunday mornings. Confirmation prep is included. This group discusses a variety of topics including Catholic faith issues, social justice, living your faith in the world, multi-faith exploration, scripture studies, and the kids are partnered with Stanford University students as mentors. Space is limited for both programs. Registration materials will be available for NEW families Sept. 7-20. There is an orientation session on Sunday, Sept. 27.

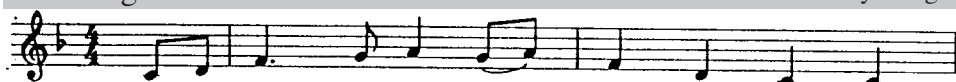
Summer Ministries:

Final Report – Back-to-School Backpacks for Children from Low-Income Families:


As of Wednesday, August 12th, the Catholic Community at Stanford (CCAS) has collected 19 backpacks filled with school supplies. In addition and with the help of a very generous and anonymous donor who donated \$500, CCAS has collected \$1,034 in cash which is more than twice the amount of our original donation goal of \$500. These donated backpacks and cash donations resulted in a total of 49 backpacks filled with school supplies. On Saturday, August 8th CCAS provided 16 volunteers at the Family Giving Tree (FGT) warehouse who sorted and stuffed 278 backpacks and placed an additional 720 completed backpacks in rows for delivery to children for a total of 1,047 backpacks. 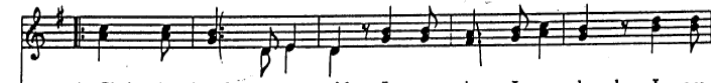

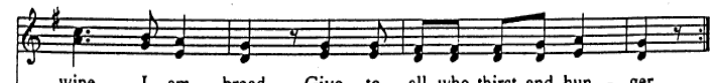
