As Catholics, we acknowledge that there will be a Judgment Day, that final day on which Christ comes again, and when we all stand in judgment on how we have lived our lives. The Catechism of the Catholic Church puts it this way: "When the Lord comes at the end of time to judge the living and the dead, the glorious Christ will render to each man and woman according to their works, and according to their acceptance or refusal of grace." (#682)

The principal author of our U.S. Bishops Pastoral Letter on Stewardship (Stewardship: A Disciple's Response) tried to explain stewardship and how it relates to judgment in this way: "Each of us has received a garden; that garden is the many gifts and graces we have received from God. At our final judgment, the Lord will only ask us one question: 'What have you done with the garden I gave you?'"

Do I Belong?

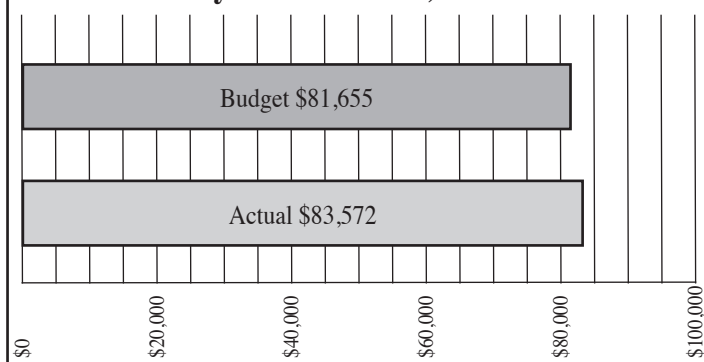

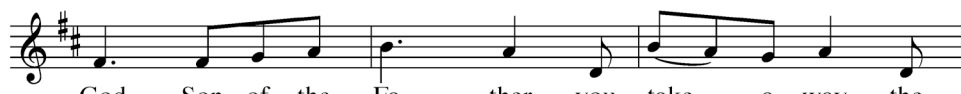
The Sons of St. Joseph, Catholic Men's group:

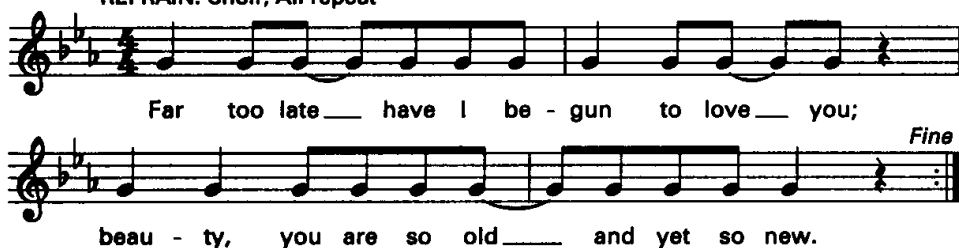

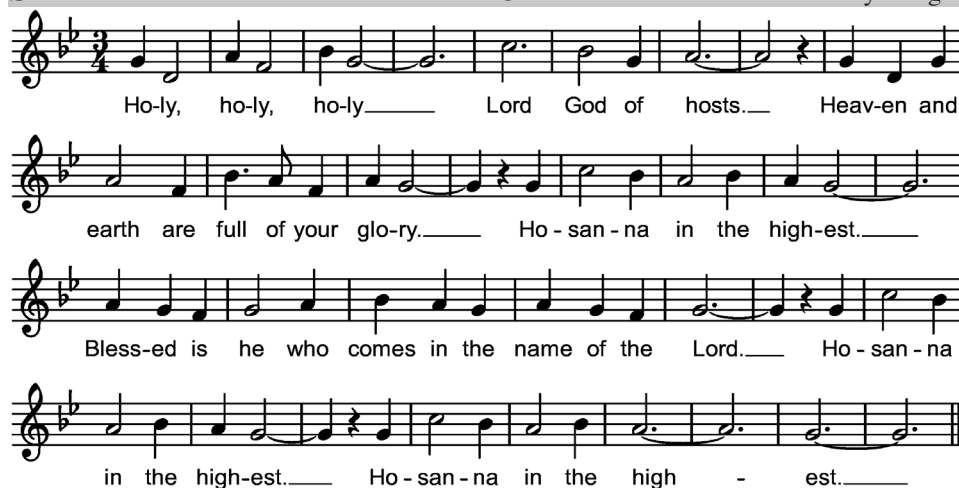
Far too late have I begun to love you; you were there within me,

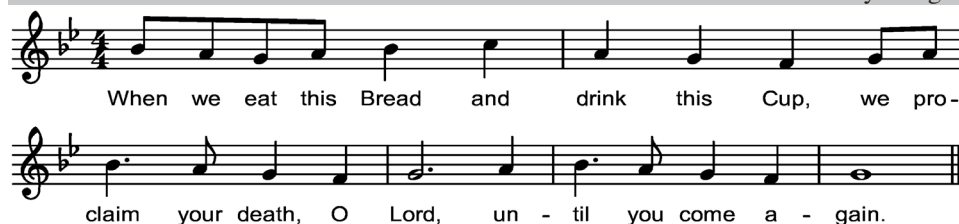

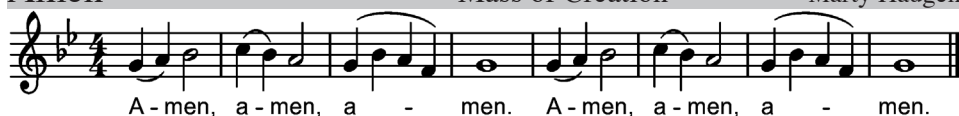

Newman Nights Lecture: Saint? Oppressor? St. Junipero Serra in his historical context

Junipero Serra's Approach to the Native Peoples of the Californias. Old Union (3rd floor), CIRCLE Common Room. Tuesday, the 13th of October, 2015.

The canonization of Junipero Serra has raised a thorny issue: how do you assess a man? Was he a Catholic saint or a Spanish oppressor? Explore the history in a lecture by Dr. Rose Marie Beebe and Dr. Robert Senkewicz.

Dr. Rose Marie Beebe is Professor of Spanish Literature, and Dr. Robert Senkewicz is Professor of History, both at Santa Clara University. They have collaborated on a number of books on the history of Spanish and Mexican California. Their latest volume is *Junipero Serra: California, Indians, and the Transformation of a Missionary* (University of Oklahoma Press, 2015). They have received numerous teaching and scholarship awards at Santa Clara, as well as awards from The Bancroft Library, the Historical Society of Southern California, the California Mission Studies Association, and the California Council for the Promotion of History.
