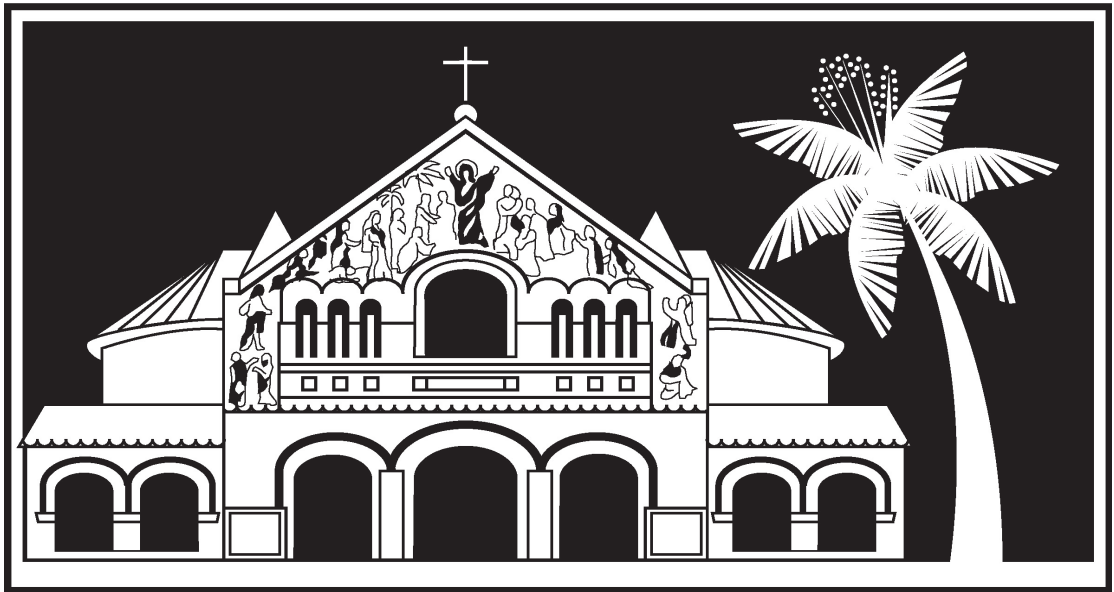

Resources: Professional Staff time 5-10 hours weekly

This position and sacramental preparation could be one FT position- \$35-\$40,000

(5 year total = \$175 – 200K)

Tasks:

- 5.1 Identify, using personal outreach to as many community members as possible, specific ways in which the Permanent Community needs to be served.
- 5.2 Create opportunities for collaboration/engagement with the student community.
- 5.3 Provide educational/religious development options which include or are specifically geared toward the Permanent Community, such as study groups, classes, on-line commentaries on scripture, etc.
- 5.4 Create a greater sense of community through fellowship, support groups, affinity groups, social events, dinners with priests and staff, special events around holidays.
- 5.5 Support families in their day-to-day dealings with children, their work and their spiritual development.
- 5.6 Reinstate our annual welcome/thank- you reception for Permanent Community members. Cost: \$3,500
